The Appeal unites Soroptimists, Clubs, Unions and the five Federations, with the aim of delivering tangible benefits to some of the world's most marginalized women, girls, and their communities. This project dove tales very well with the Soroptimist of the Americas Dream Projects. "Opening Doors to a Bright Future" will cement the Soroptimist belief and commitment to Education throughout the life-course, and its immense power and fundamental role as a driver for sustainable development, peace, and equality.

Investing in girls' education brings high rewards, breaking cycles of poverty and aiding economic growth. Education empowers women, girls, and their communities, delivering skills and knowledge, while increasing confidence. Education and Mentoring enables women and girls to make informed decisions affecting their future wellbeing, health, participation, and quality of life.

"Education is the tool to tackle multiple barriers faced by women and girls today. Prior to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, progress was visible in the delivery of quality education around the world, however, the past 17 months, has



taken a toll, with UNICEF estimating 156 million children and young people are out of school. Of these, six out of 10 have no access to basic literacy and numeracy.

Estimates further suggest 750 million adults are illiterate, with many living in poverty, facing marginalization, and disadvantage. Inequitable access to educational resources and learning is exacerbated by the digital divide, and as such, opening the door to education is an essential goal in each of our Appeal projects.

Our first-place recipient, Mandy Van Dijk Hutt agreed to let us share her story. She is an amazing woman who has overcome many challenges in her life. Here is a summary of her story.



I was a young mom. My first child was born when I was 19 and due to financial hardships, I had to leave school. Her dad unfortunately chose to not be in her life and so I put 100% of my focus on supporting her. For a very brief time I was on food stamps and state assistance, I had to live in low-income

housing, and I was determined to do better. I worked 3 jobs to get us off state assistance. I was very thankful that it was available for us, but I wanted it to go to others who I felt needed it more than we did.

I married 3 years later and had 2 more children, boys. I continued to stress education to my own children throughout their lives. In 2010 my husband passed away from cancer. His battle was 10 months long and through it we were able to say our goodbyes and have the hard talks. He died at home with our family surrounding him and I believe his death was peaceful as he had asked. After that, I had very little hope left, I was sad, exhausted, and scared about the future, but I had to keep going for my kids.

Through these 11 years without him, I experienced extreme grief, challenges and put the pieces of our lives back together to where we have healed and keep going with the void still a part of our lives. My children have achieved so many wonderful things these past 11 years. The journey did not come without struggles, I worked multiple jobs at a time to get them raised and through school. I hid many tears and many struggles.

A few years
ago, my son,
who was
wanting to drop
out of college,
said "how can
you push us to
get a degree
when you never
got yours?" I
realized he was



right, how could I? So, the next day I showed up at his school with my new student ID card in hand and said, "If I have to finish school, so do you." From there a dream became a reality.

I had always regretted not finishing my education. Now I have a new drive, a new purpose. Through my husband's cancer journey there was so much focus on medicine and so little focus on the end of life that when it finally came to the final days, we were unprepared as to what to expect. I was grateful to a hospice nurse who lovingly guided me through. In his journey of death and being present for others in my family who have passed away, I found my purpose. To be with patients and families during the last moments of their lives. To guide them through the process of transition, to help them pass on peacefully. Through this I have learned the art of reiki for pain management, meditation, of holding and creating a calming and peaceful space in which someone can die, while allowing their families to say their last goodbyes.

Once I have my degree as a counselor I plan to open "The Center for Grief", where those experiencing grief (not only death related) can come to express their emotions through art therapy, music therapy, yoga, exercise, movement, meditation, gardening, group therapy, and recreational outdoor therapy. If I can make a difference in the life of one person, who finds themselves as lost and empty as I felt in my empty shell 11 years ago, then I have successfully reached my dream.

I only have 1 year until my Bachelor's; I can't quit now. I just need some help getting there.
