Inspiring Women and Girls with March Projects, Dream it Be it and Big Goal - By Carma Ingram

Our club has been really busy keeping up with presentations at a couple of schools, as well as, the Women's Resource Center in March. We first attended Roosevelt Continuation School on March 6th where we had 12 girls attend. Kathy Margaritis and Michelle Jackson did a presentation on Values Clarification. Donna Schultz, Carma Ingram, and Rita Offrett were in attendance there as well. The girls were very respectful and seemed to enjoy the exercises, overall presentation, and making bookmarks..

On March 7th we attended Granite Connections High School where we brought in four career speakers to talk to the girls about their careers. We had about 25 girls at this event. Our career speakers were Kellie Ju Huntzinger who spoke about her various careers as a dental assistant, dental office manager, pedicurist, and working for UPS. Kate Anderson, one of our Live Your Dream Award Winners, came and spoke to the girls about nursing and the variety of opportunities they would have in that field. Karllen Johnson spoke to the girls about a music career, and Katie Payne spoke to the girls about being a successful graphic artist. The girls totally enjoyed this class with a lot of questions being asked of our presenters.

On March 8th we went to the Women's Resource Center and Carma gave a presentation on using positive affirmations to change the way your brain thinks and bringing positivity into your life. Rita Offrett, Pat Murdoch, and Donna Schultz were there to provide support and additional information to the ladies. We had 20 women attend this class, which was the most that we have had at any class there so far.

On March 21st, we had Kathy Williams at Horizonte Adult Education present on Overcoming Obstacles. Kathy Williams is retired now but our club worked with her for over 20 years at Horizonte when we were presenting to the Young Parents Program. We had 13 girls to participate in this session. While we were there their teacher, Natalie Shiozawa, told us that the girls said they loved us coming and wished we came more often. Kathy gave a great presentation on overcoming obstacles and brought the girls journals to write in.

We have no further sessions scheduled for DIBI this year but will do three more Big Goal Accelerator presentations, two at Horizonte and one at the Women's Resource Center. The dates for these events are 4/18 & 5/16 at Horizonte and 4/19 at the Women's Resource Center.


