

Single mothers work hard to establish and stay within a budget; however, when Christmas comes around, the budget often goes out the window and mothers find themselves in financial debt before they start the New Year.



Breakfast with Santa was created to ensure single mothers get off to a good start in the New Year.

To qualify, a single mom Mother must be in an educational program to become self-reliant. Example: accredited State or

private college or technical school. She needs to be head of her own household (lives alone with children), and the children must be under 18 and living with their mother.

Soroptimist of the Americas has a Big Goal to invest in the dreams of 500,000 women and girls by 2031. In order to meet that goal, each club is encouraged to participate in a Big Goal Accelerator Project each year to enhance the numbers of women and girls that we serve. Our club is going use our Breakfast with Santa participants that are in education as a count towards our Big Goal Accelerator Project. We will also count any scholarship that we award the Dream It Be It girls.

Big Goal Accelerator Projects

Club and region work that increases access to education for women and girls facing obstacles and leads to economic empowerment will count towards our next Big Goal! Clubs and regions wanted their local work to count, and now it will! Starting in 2021, SIA will begin collecting information from clubs and regions about their work outside of the Dream Programs that contributes to our 2021-2031 Big Goal. These projects will be called Big Goal Accelerator Projects. It is important to note that not all club and region projects will count toward the next Big Goal.

Big Goal Accelerator Project Eligibility What criteria must projects meet to be eligible?

To be eligible, club and region work must meet all five of the following criteria:

- 1. Work only with women and/or girls who are facing obstacles
- 2. Provide access to education
- 3. Ultimately lead to economic empowerment
- 4. Be a Soroptimist-led hands-on project
- 5. Be reported to SIA through the official reporting link

What do we mean by "obstacles?"

These are some examples of the obstacles that can make accessing education more difficult for a woman or girl:

- Poverty
- Violence
- Racism
- Teen pregnancy
- Being a foster care youth
- Trafficking
- Single parenting
- Substance abuse disorder

What are some examples of projects that increase access to education for our target population of women and girls facing obstacles?

- Scholarships/awards (for college, technical/vocational school, advanced degrees)
- Removing obstacles (providing necessary items for education like computers, internet, transportation; paying fees for college-preparation exams, college applications, entrance exams, or professional licensure)

• Classes (focused on job training, skills training, applying for financial aid/college, computer training, career mentorship)
