A Successful Big Goal Completed at Horizonte

The final and fifth class for the Horizonte Youth-to-Adult group was on March 16. Carma Ingram arranged for four professional speakers with careers that the girls requested. The 11 girls in attendance were engaged and asked several questions as the day progressed. All speakers emphasized putting forth your best effort in going after your dreams. Additionally stated was the importance of cultivating a belief in yourself regardless or what others tell you (family, teachers, friends). Sometimes that can be your fuel to prove them wrong.

We started off with a retired Pharmacist, Mark Crosby who spoke about the variety of job options available with a degree in Pharmacy or Pharmacy Tech. He said the career focuses on helping people to have their happiest life possible. Mark told the girls if they enjoyed working with people, math, and the sciences this may be a good career choice. A short one year program in Pharmacy Tech could pay around \$20-30 per hour with a Pharmacist (a 6 year degree) starting at triple that pay. He mentioned several schools to attend for these programs.

Gabby Garcia was a former Horizonte student that graduated at age 19 with two children. As she relayed her story, the girls became very interested and hopeful. She had a rough growing up, but utilized LYD resources and a Horizonte scholarship to gain her education in criminal justice. She's been working for the SLC Justice Courts for the past 18 years (to present) in a variety of jobs. Due to the stability of that job, she has been able to buy a home, gain more education (Master Esthetician & Massage Therapist) and start her own Spa business. She emphasized continual learning, utilizing resources, and working towards your dreams.

Kate Anderson an RN and business owner also spoke about continually being open to new opportunities and striving toward your dreams. She had believed she wouldn't be able to complete the schooling and licensing test to become a nurse. But, by giving up extra things and working hard she completed that dream. She has learned a lot working with people at the end of their life (Hospice nurse). Kate has built on her career by seeing a need and fulfilling it by opening an IV business in addition to working as a nurse. She was nice to speak for us here as well as at Granite Connection for DIBI.

Our final engaging speaker was Patty Shea, a School Counselor from Roosevelt Continuation School and Granite Connection. She told students that they have choices when they graduate to either 1. Employ (get a job), 2. Enlist (in military), or 3. Enroll in school. Patty talked to the girls about many opportunities that exist with apprenticeships to gain schooling while being paid to work in that career

(Apprenticeship.utah.gov). She also introduced them to various web sites that they can utilize to see where they qualify to go to school (AdmitUtah.org), FAFSA, and Keys to Success (with many resources).


Watch for Signs of Abuse By- Kathy Margaritis

Two of the quarterly themes of UpliftHER were Intimate Partner Violence and Trafficking. These themes were brought forth to shed light on the needs of women and girls and provide project ideas that would benefit women-girls that are in need. As we work with girls in the schools during DIBI and with our Big Goal projects, we need to be watchful and educate the girls and women on warning signs of abuse. While I was working in the Granite School District, staff were given several annual trainings about child abuse prevention, trafficking and how to recognize signs of trafficking and abuse victims. This is due to a big increase of these problems. Sometimes because of economic pressures, even family members are forcing children into trafficking situations.



During our recent Region Conference we heard from a survivor of sex trafficking. Maria, founder of an organization that helps survivors rebuild their lives. District V Director Shelley Rask, SI Virginia, found Maria while looking for speakers that would augment the UpliftHer categories. Maria provided this Power & Control Wheel that shows various ways that an abuser is able to control a victim. We see some of these same behaviors in intimate partner violence situations.

Part of the challenge is to help victims realize they are being abused. It often takes 7-9 times for the victim to finally leave their abusive situation for good. It takes a lot of support to get the victim to that place. If you recognize these signs in someone you know or are working with, there are many resources to help. Check out the Soroptimist website and also A Bolder Way Forward website and there are links to many other resources.

Soroptimist Attended A Bolder Way Forward Summit

Soroptimist were represented at the 3rd Annual A Bolder Way Forward (ABWF) Summit, on June 6th. Carolyn Roberts, Kathy Margaritis, Michelle Jackson, and Rachel Woodhouse joined hundreds of other advocates that support this organizations efforts. The ABWF Summit was a celebration of the statewide movement and the actions needed to build a state where more girls and women can thrive in every setting. Over the past two years, 18 areas of focus (spokes) have worked with 12 additional impact teams to address issues that permeate across and influence each area of focus.

Susan Madsen, founder of Utah Women and Leadership Project, at Utah State University, spoke about the necessity of speeding up the work in Utah (and nationwide). Similar to the Soroptimist "Accelerate Action" and "UpliftHER" movements, there is an urgency to create more gender equity and fight against the rise of violence against women and girls (children).

We attended various focus area groups where we discussed what progress had been made and what the future goals entailed. In the Higher Education Attainment Spoke area, there are persistent gaps in participation in post secondary training with a big need to raise completion rates. In our Soroptimist work with girls and women in the schools (DIBI and Big Goal), we need to impress upon them the economic consequences for individuals, families, and the State when they don't pursue higher education. Plus, the more Live Your Dream awards we can give away, we will help more women attain further education.

The afternoon finished off with meeting with partners in our county to discuss the services our organizations provide and how to access various resources. It was an inspiring day of meeting new partners in the important work we all do.
