Barbara went on to announce the fundraising successes and challenges of the **Fall Fundraiser** totaling \$1,685 with the online auction. ## April's Club Meeting Continued

Kathy Margaritis and Pat Murdoch gave reports on the impact of the **Dream It Be It and Big Goal programs.** Dream It Be It had 6 workshops in 2025 with training for about 128 girls. The sessions were at Granite Connections High School and Roosevelt Continuation School (8<sup>th</sup> graders). Some of the topics included vision boards, goal setting, values clarification and setbacks, and a Career Day with speakers working in a variety of fields. These DIBI classes are completed for the year.

The club has been doing two separate service projects that qualify as Big Goal projects. One is at the Women's Resource Center and the other at the Youth-to- Adult program at Horizonte. The training uses some of the DIBI curriculum but is geared more towards the different needs of the women we are servicing. By the end of May, we plan to complete 9 workshops with 140 women who have gone through the trainings.

We then heard from Natalie (teacher) and Maria (Adult Ed. Coordinator) from Horizonte Adult Education about how the girls have enjoyed the classes. They both had strong stories of resilience from when they attended the teen parent program at Horizonte and how Soroptimist impacted their lives. Not only did they participate in DIBI classes and mentoring, Maria benefitted from book grants and tuition help. They both expressed appreciation for our Soroptimist club and many of the members who had blessed their lives. They have both advanced in their careers and are completing education.

Barbara thanked everyone for attending and adjourned the meeting.



# **Soroptimist at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women** By– Carolyn Roberts

Since becoming a Soroptimist and discovering that we have representation at the United Nations, I have been curious about Soroptimist International's role in influencing global policies. My dream of seeing the United Nations in action came true in March when I had the privilege of attending the 69th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW69) at the United Nations in New York City, accompanied by Peaks to Plains Region Governor Harriet Beck.

#### Soroptimist International – General Consultive Status

The Commission on the Status of Women is just one of many important conferences conducted by the United Nations. Soroptimist International is among the 6500 non-governmental organizations (NGOs) authorized to engage in United Nations meetings, each to a different extent. Soroptimist International holds General Consultive Status, the highest level of engagement. Only 2% of all participating NGOs have this distinction and authority. With this status, Soroptimist International has significant influence across numerous United Nations initiatives by engaging in debates, delivering oral presentations, and submitting written statements.

#### CSW69

The conference was held for two weeks in March with over 100 different meetings and sessions held each day. There were over 5000 people registered with 148 Soroptimist delegates. The Soroptimist delegates were visiting from over 30 different countries.

Harriet and I attended CSW69 as delegates, allowing us to access meetings despite not being official representatives. Various countries, organizations, and advocacy groups worked together to sponsor over 100 different sessions each day. Soroptimist International collaborated on an impressive 15 events. Navigating the choices was one of our biggest challenges, given the excessive number of meetings and the limited time available. We managed to participate in four meetings per day.

The sessions covered a myriad of subjects. Topics ranged from child marriage and the impact of artificial intelligence on women, to the fight against female genital mutilation and gender-based violence. Other sessions highlighted trafficked migrant workers and celebrated a story of three Extra-ordinary women. All meetings were thought-provoking and included a call to action. If you are interested in attending as a Soroptimist delegate in the future, you can apply to Soroptimist International of the Americas in the fall. There is no registration fee, but all expenses are the responsibility of the individual. If you would like to learn more, seek me out.




# Getting to Know YOU!

# **Stress Management for Horizonte Students & Us!**



On Friday, April 18th we had our 4th Big Goal class with 12 students at Horizonte Youth-to-Adult program. The girls were very engaged with the interesting presentation that Donna Schultz had prepared which included journal writing prompts and chair yoga stretches. The short breathing and meditation that Carma Ingram taught, was the final stress release piece. It was so helpful to listen to this great lesson about recognizing stress symptoms and practicing techniques to manage our stress. Additionally, Michelle Jackson taught the girls about creating resumes using action verbs, writing cover letters, and interview techniques. Most of the girls have had jobs (or do) and seemed to understand the importance of putting themselves out there professionally. Kathy Margaritis assisted with encouraging the girls at their tables, but mostly enjoyed the exercises for stress release.

Some ideas that were discussed were recognizing the physiological signs when you are becoming anxious or stressed and breathing through those initial moments. Many times stress comes from not being in the present but thinking about the past or fearing for the future. When negative thought come, notice your thoughts without judgement, challenge you thoughts (what is my evidence?), and reframe your thoughts to be more positive and self supportive. It was emphasized how important self care is and the yoga and meditation were examples that they were able to practice. Thank you to the Soroptimist that supported us in sharing these important life skills with these young women.

## **3rd Peaks to Plains Region Spring Conference**

Alternate Delegate Summary by Kathy Margaritis

Fort Collins Colorado treated us to beautiful sunny days and the smell of spring lilacs,

when we were able to make it outside to enjoy. The conference was packed full of many knowledgeable speakers, fun connections with members, good meals, and cute goodie baskets to buy. Governor Harriet Beck called the conference to order and started the opening ceremonies. I was impressed by the official nature of our organization and the patriotic pledge and song.

We were then honored to hear from *SIA International Board of Directors member, Melanie Kenny*, from SI of Saskatoon in Saskatchewan, Canada. She spoke of the need to embrace change for growth and to remain relevant in the world. Stressing that we create an inclusive environment within our clubs, she recommended three vital actions: 1) Listen actively and hear what is being said.

- 2) Be respectful and treat others with kindness.
- 3) Speak up if you see someone that's being disrespectful, quietly help the person to see the impact of their behavior on others.

Melanie encouraged us to embrace change, celebrate our successes (share our stories), and commit to inclusivity!

**Region Pillar Presentations** filled the afternoon with many good ideas being presented. Engagement/Membership- Combating the Great Membership Decline was presented by Kelly Eissinger. It was noted that volunteering needs to be valued and celebrated and meetings need to be fun, friendly, and include hands-on projects. We should increase our efforts to build membership, and tap into under represented groups by highlighting our accomplishments and showing how our programs promote change for girls/women in our community. Promote the benefits of membership such as building connections, access to leadership development, and a purpose of making a tangible impact. Our efforts can be highlighted through several ways which were highlighted in the Recognition/Public Awareness presentations by Linda Tremeling and Meslissa Watson. Their comments centered around utilizing social media and having an effective website. Consistently post something interesting weekly (on a variety of sites), emphasizing accomplishments and why we are passionate about our mission. Always use the Soroptimist logo and hashtags like #Soroptimist #nonprofitorganization #Peakstoplainsregion and #DreamitBeit, etc. The question is "how well do we do social media," not "if we do social media."

The *Impact/Program Pillar* was presented by Jennifer Erickson and she relayed SIA's goal to reach 500,000 women and girls by 2031. To stay on track, we must increase our Live Your Dream awards and Big Goal projects by 10% each year; the Dream It Be It programs must increase each year by 25% until 26-27 and by 15% until 2031. She emphasized keeping an open mindset and trying again. One idea was to ask a local business to support a LYD scholarship and utilize them as a judge and participant in awards. Focus on how we can impact more women with our Big Goal projects.

Philanthropy/Fundraising with confidence was presented by Ann Rutledge with an emphasis on fostering long term connections and strengthening our approach. Think of the "ask" as an invitation for them to help you create meaningful change. Utilize storytelling for emotional connection, networking, and be transparent with what their donations directly support. Be sure to recognize donors in many ways.

Carolyn and Cheri showed us the Peaks to Plains website and explained that registration would now be directly on the website: Peaks2plains.square.site *(check it out)*. The day finished off with an informative presentation by Carolyn and Governor Harriet about their trip to the UN (see page 4-5 for Carolyn's article/pictures).

Saturday morning started with a Celebration of Life Memorial Service honoring many soroptimists that had passed away during the year. We were inspired learning about several women that had contributed greatly to our mission during their lives.



The keynote speaker was Maria Tell, Founder of *A Courageous Rose Foundation*, supporting survivors of human trafficking (www.acourageousrose.org). Maria began by telling us that she was at this same hotel five years ago with her trafficker, hunched over looking at the floor, with a black eye, a branding tattoo and no one noticing her. These are just a few of the red flags that she brought to our attention. She emphasized that trafficking happens everywhere, she was recruited on a CO college campus but ended up in a very rural area eventually. Hers was a story of resilience in

escaping from her captors and making a new life for herself and her children. Dedicating herself to helping survivors has also been essential for her healing journey.

The Live Your Dream luncheon celebrated Region LYD award winners. We were able to see video's or hear speeches from all of the winners. Our Salt Lake City first place winner, Rosemarie Garduno, won 5th place at Region and gave a speech of gratitude to Soroptimist and commitment to her goals.

Official visitor, Melanie Kenny, gave us a call to action. She encouraged members to complete our journey of personal growth through change. The stages of change are denial, anger, acceptance, and lastly adaptation. Identify when you are experiencing change and appreciate how it can help you become resilient!

Each district director recognized their clubs for the accomplishments they have made during the year. Governor Harriet announced upcoming conference dates and adjourned our official meeting, inviting all to the evening banquet dinner.
